President's Message

As I write this, ice is off the lake, water levels are manageable, grass is greening, and we look forward to a new season on Golden Lake. A season where we are anxious for meet and greet opportunities we so badly missed over the past two years.

Our Board is anxious to get back to pre-Covid life at the lake. We recognize there are still some concerns about the pandemic, but we are working on the belief we can now manage life with Covid and regain some "normal" in our lives here at the lake. This includes personal canvassing starting the May long weekend, holding an Annual General Meeting at the Killaloe Public School in July, bringing back the Poker Run on the long weekend in August, and hosting a Volunteer Appreciation dinner at the end of August. Board meetings - in person - are scheduled for the coming year, continuing the work we have carried on for you throughout the pandemic challenges.

We may have been quiet, but we have not been idle. Regular Board meetings and two Annual general meetings were held since 2020; and we are happy to finally close our Zoom account! We have several initiatives in place for the coming year: a Junior Lake Steward summer position, a new committee addressing Invasive Species (flora and fauna!), an advisory committee to work with local municipalities/ interest groups to inform them of our goals and activities. FISH COMMITTEE

The NDMNRF (Ministry of Northern Development, Mines, Natural Resources and Forestry) will be conducting a sonar survey on the lake in early August. We will have a member of the Fish Committee

participating with this 2-3 night survey. At the conclusion, the ministry will provide a presentation to show their findings and we will post that information on the GLPOA website. We plan to have additional information on this survey available at the 2022 Area General Meeting.

The tough decision was made not to have a Smelt Fry this year due to the committee not knowing where



COVID restrictions would be at when we needed to start planning. There has been a lot of interest this year in folks wanting to join in on the harvesting. Nets and headlamps continued to be provided along with updates posted on Facebook. An exciting new opportunity was provided by Councillor Angelina Commanda who worked with the Pikwakanagan Cultural Coordinator who agreed to take any smelt caught for their community feast!

On Apr 19 snowpack levels in Algonquin Park continued to diminish at a slow rate with the cooler than average temperatures we have been having <u>https://www.renfrewpg.ca/.../upl.../SNow-graph-2021-2022.pdf</u> Golden Lake is slowly rising however well below the average and certainly below the levels of the flood years of 2017/ 2019. <u>https://www.renfrewpg.ca/wp.../</u> <u>uploads/Golden-Lake-2022.pdf</u> This is .33 meters above the lowest point of the winter or .17 meters below the average summer operating levels.

In contact with RPG on Apr 19 they had 6 logs in at the Tramore dam. Snow is gone from their sample area as of an April 14th check. We are in a good position at both Round and Golden lakes as far as getting to summer levels. RPG will continue slowly to achieve this as weather is still all over the place with respect to temperatures and precipitation. Levels at Golden Lake are stable at that time, so logs were not needed however they were added on Apr 21, so it is day by day as significant rain events or lack of rain could change this.

On May 2 they are removing another log from Golden Lake that makes 3 now. For clarification when it's stated that a log is being removed it is from one sluice. If stated 3 logs out as of today this means 1 log out of three different sluices over the past week.

They would like to lower levels slightly to be able to accept future rain events. RPG will continue to monitor and remove more logs if needed. Round Lake seems to be stabilized, if they need to lower levels there then logs will be removed at Golden to pass the water through as needed. The goal here is to be at summer levels by May 24th weekend. Please take some time before you journey out to fish on Golden Lake to review the important changes to bait movement. Four new BMZ (Bait Management Zones) have been created to minimize the transport of bait from outside our zone to the lake. To save you a bit of reading – please note that Golden Lake is FMZ (Fisheries Management Zone) #15 and begins on page 109. This publication is a great resource regarding everything you need to fish safety this year!

GLPOA uses the Lake Partner Program for our water testing. The goal of the program is to better understand and protect the quality of Ontario's inland lakes by involving citizens in a volunteerbased program. The Lake Partner Program is a province-wide, volunteerbased, water-quality monitoring program. All samples are collected and sent to their lab for analysis. There is no charge for this service. Results are typically posted every April – ours have not been updated yet. As per their recommendation, the deepest part of the big lake, and the deepest part of Tranquility Bay are where we test. They are tested for total phosphorus, chloride and calcium twice a year. Water clarity is tested monthly.

GLPOA deploys and maintains a significant number of red and green shoal markers to assist with safe and enjoyable navigation. The markers are deployed on or before the long weekend in May and removed on or after Thanksgiving. Please understand that the markers are all maintained and placed by volunteers and exact dates may be difficult to adhere to. We appreciate everyone's assistance to help keep the lake safe for boating by reporting any missing or damaged buoys. Also, be aware that while we have a significant buoy program, with the mainly rocky shoreline there are many unmarked hazards close to shore, and particularly off the many points around the lake. Please practice proper boating etiquette and safe practices when out on the water.

Invasive Species

Why should you care and what is being done about invasive species here in Ontario?

In Ontario, there are hundreds of invasive species that out compete native sportfish, plants, and animals, impact real estate prices and can even cause physical harm such as skin burns. (www.greenshovels.ca)

In this newsletter, we would like to focus on what is considered one of Canada's worst invasive species (Phragmites) and what your GLPOA is doing about it.

"Phrag" is a very tall and fast-

growing perennial grass that now covers nearly 17,000 hectares of shoreline, wetlands and road allowances. It creates ecological dead zones and impacts all at-risk species.

The GLPOA board became aware of the Green Shovels Collaborative Initiative through FOCA and applied (and received) a grant to allow us to begin the first step in the process of identifying its presence around our lake. This will take place this summer once a qualified professional has been secured. I would encourage all property owners to download this brochure and communicate the information in it to all those who live or visit your property. With the new addition of our Invasive species division, one thing we all need to be aware of is the Clean, Drain, Dry campaign. https://canadainvasives.ca/programs/clean-drain-dry/The Clean, Drain, Dry campaign is a reminder that all of us - and our guests, are all responsible to stop the spread of harmful aquatic invasive species through changes in behaviour. If you are putting your boat, canoe, paddleboard, etc. from one body of water to another, you must

CLEAN Inspect and clean plants, animals and mud from watercraft, trailer and gear. DRAIN Drain all water from your watercraft, trailer and gear (e.g. buckets, well, bilge, ballast etc.) DRY Dry all parts of your watercraft, trailer and gear completely between trips. No Water craft? You can still help by taking the following actions:

- Understand the threats of aquatic invasive species.
- Learn to recognize aquatic invasive species and know where to look for them.
- Clean, Drain and Dry all guest watercraft, trailer, motors, and gear every time.
- Never release or move fish, animals, or plants from one waterbody into another.
- Report new sightings of aquatic invasive species.
- Help inform others about the threat of aquatic invasive species.
- Encourage your elected officials to support measures that prevent aquatic invasive species.

My family has had a cottage on Island View Drive -- down near the small end of the lake -- for several generations now and my brothers and I spent every summer here while we were growing up.
